
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Food Security in South Africa:

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

Many South Africans face poverty and hunger on a daily basis




Size of the South African Farming Community

South African farmers are advanced in age and are slowly "dying out" in numbers


The average age of SA farmers is 62 (Agri SA)




Commercial farming in South Africa has decreased



1991 Farm Land Distribution in South Africa (%)




Land Utilisation for Commercial Farming





Decline in Staple Agricultural Production


Production of staple commodities have declined, while production of luxury (more expensive) food products have increased



International Competition

South African farmers face competition by cheap subsidised imports of agricultural food products dumped from abroad at below production cost

Farmers are requesting subsidies and asking for increased import duties, but this may further increase the cost of food products (Sources: WFF & AMIE)

Examples:

- Between 2006 and 2008 there was a 263% increase in imported wheat, and South Africa was set to import 1,6 million tons of wheat in the 2010–11 year (Source: WFF)

Farming Challenges to Food Security in SA

South African farmers have to cope with the following risks that eventually influence food security in the country:



Theft and other losses: Especially live stock



Land reform: 90% failure rate (Source: WWF)



Stricter rates for financing; more debt*



Farm attacks and murders: 277 attacks & 67

murders in 2014 (Source: AfriForum)



Increased production costs: PPI almost

tripled since 2000 (Source: DAFF)




Unreliable supply in electricity

Will we have food in 10-20 years from now?

South Africa will <u>not</u> have a sufficient and accessible food supply in future if the following are not addressed:

- Implementing effective government policies to ensure the success of land reform in terms of continued agricultural output
- Provision of subsidies to both established commercial farmers and emerging/developing black farmers
- Increasing the number of new (young) entrants to the farming community
- Establishing an equilibrium between local supply and imports in order to stimulate healthy competition
- Proper management of resources such as electricity and water supply
- Economic growth, which goes hand in hand with decrease in unemployment rate, decrease in crime and contribution of the Agriculture Sector to the country's growth in annual GDP
- Developing sustainable and economic farming methods

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
